

Youth Tour: Shaping Our Youth for 50 Years



MESSAGE FROM GENERAL MANAGER ALAN LESLEY

THE GOVERNMENT-IN-ACTION YOUTH TOUR

just turned 50! And oh, what a tour it's been.

"I love this trip. Every year is a new adventure," says Esther Dominguez, the Texas delegation's statewide Youth Tour coordinator.

Youth Tour brings together teens from 43 states (about 120 students from Texas) for a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity: a week in Washington, D.C. Students visit monuments and museums and get to know the roots of American history. They meet their congressional representatives and learn about electric co-ops and political advocacy. They dance on a boat cruising down the Potomac River. They live in close quarters for up to a week and are given a small taste of freedom and independence. They sleep little and talk a lot.

Honor and a Blessing

For those accepted into the Youth Leadership Council, the Youth Tour experience is even richer. These students—one representative from each participating state—work in the congressional action center at the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's annual meeting. They also participate in a special meeting to delve more deeply into leadership and grassroots issues.

"The Youth Tour was life-changing," said Meagan Johnson, the CECA representative who was chosen to join the Youth Leadership Council in 2011. "Through the Youth Tour and my participation in the Youth Leadership Council, I was able to learn about cooperatives on a larger scale and make lifelong friends."

Labor of Love

For the chaperones and state coordinators, Youth Tour is an enormous amount of work all year long, culminating in just a handful of fun and frantic days each year. Flexibility and being able to roll with the punches are must-haves. But it's a labor of love for most: "Rewarding" is a common refrain heard from those involved in the program, from administrators and coordinators to parents and participants.

"Youth Tour is an amazing opportunity for both the participants and the chaperones," says CECA's Rachel Ford, who has chaperoned the tour twice.

"Our statewide organization coordinates dates and begins planning Youth Tour for the following year as soon as the group returns home. A tremendous amount of preparation is put into the agenda for the following year. There are many places, such as the National Cathedral and the Kennedy Center, that have very long waiting lists for tickets.

"The reward, however, comes when the coordinators see the participants' faces. The anticipation, pictures being taken and smiles are all worth it. As a two-time chaperone, the most incredible feeling is seeing the participants change during this trip.

"There are many places we visit, such as the Arlington National Cemetery, the

Vietnam [Veterans] Memorial and the Holocaust [Memorial] Museum, that are incredibly moving and such an enormous part of our nation's history. These students come back to their cities and towns with a much greater respect and appre-

ciation for history. Chaperoning Youth Tour is a rewarding experience where memories are made and friendships are built.”

Rooted in Politics

The Youth Tour was born from a speech at the 1957 NRECA annual meeting by then-Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson. An advocate of electric co-ops, he had lobbied for their creation in Texas in 1937. “If one thing comes out of this meeting, it will be sending youngsters to the national capital, where they can actually see what the flag stands for and represents,” the future president said.

With that encouragement, Texas electric co-ops began sending summer interns to work in the senator’s Washington, D.C., office. In 1958, an electric co-op in Iowa sponsored the first weeklong study tour of the nation’s capital.

In 1964, the NRECA began to coordinate activities among the state delegations. The first year of the coordinated tour included about 400 teens from 12 states. As word spread over the years, the program grew to more than 1,600 in 2014.

Lifelong Connections

It’s not uncommon for Youth Tour friends to keep in touch long after everyone’s gone home. Many reconnect in college or in their later careers, sometimes becoming roommates, co-workers, colleagues—and sometimes even spouses. For all the participants, Youth Tour plays a part in forming the people they will become.

“We’re excited to see what our future leaders accomplish,” says Martin Bevins, a Youth Tour chaperone from Texas Electric Cooperatives. “To know that electric cooperatives played a small part in their development is truly something special.”


CECA AMI Installation Update

CONTRACT CREWS WITH TEXAS METER DEVICE, an experienced electric system installation service out of Waco, will install new, updated electric meters in the CECA service area. Crews are currently or will be replacing all of the meters in areas serviced by the Rising Star, Holde and Zephyr substations. This area is depicted in the map at right.

The installation of new meters will cause a brief service disruption lasting no more than a couple of minutes or less, in most cases.

All meters on the CECA system must be changed out. Therefore, each meter location in our service territory will be visited by TMD at some time. As this project progresses, we will continue to inform the CECA membership of where crews are or will be working through notices in Texas Co-op Power.


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CECA Annual Meeting Celebrates 76 Years of Service

The participating schools and their community action projects are:

Bangs: Conduct a toy drive to provide a better Christmas for community children.

Breckenridge: Clean up around the local lake and park, and put up Christmas lights.

Brownwood: Increase school spirit as well as student and community life by assisting students through a school store.

Comanche: Work with the economic development corporation to develop a marketing plan to bring a fast-food franchise to Comanche.

De Leon: Turn an empty lot next to the city hall into a multi-purpose site for the community.

Early: Improve the local environment by starting a recycling program for paper, plastic, glass, aluminum, etc.

Eastland: Honor local veterans through a memorial and an exhibit.

Gorman: Improve the downtown park area by painting the bathrooms and adding playground equipment and a sand volleyball court.

Gustine: Improve the morale of the track team by building a track.

Mullin: Project Forget-Me-Not to beautify the community.

Zephyr: Bring back the spirit and pride of Zephyr HS by improving the appearance of the campus through landscaping and cleanup projects.

CECA will be following the progress of these students as they forge onward, armed with their ideas and good community action plans. We encourage you to watch what these students are capable of, and participate in their projects by volunteering your time and resources.
